Citizen Advice Witness Volunteering

The two main roles that we recruit volunteers for are court-based and outreach volunteers. Our court volunteers support witnesses and their friends and family when they come to court. They give practical information about the process, as well as emotional support to help witnesses feel more confident when giving evidence. Our outreach volunteers provide additional support as well as this, they support vulnerable or intimidated witnesses by meeting them in a safe place to give them information and support prior to their visit to court. The roles require a training and induction process but are supported throughout the entire process and have multiple opportunities to shadow other volunteers when they first start.
