

Book Group

The book group have been meeting by email and sending comments on the books we were scheduled to read.

June's book was 'The Librarian' by Salley Vickers. (Yes, I have spelt the name correctly) It is the story of a young librarian taking up a job at the children's library in a small south counties town in the late 1960's. She is very keen to encourage children to read. The chief librarian is anti her efforts. At first she is successful with the help of a volunteer who is having an affair with the chief librarian. Events, including an affair with the local doctor, conspire to complicate her life and increase the opposition eventually to mean she has to leave, having overcome some of the opposition. The final part of the book ties up a lot of the loose ends telling what had happened to the three main children, Lizzie who Silvia had helped pass her eleven plus and who was now a successful children's author, Sam who although bright had failed his eleven plus but was now a successful scientist in Australia and Marigold who was the source of all the trouble and who had made little of her life. It left the possibility that Sam and Lizzie would get together.

Everyone seems to have enjoyed the book and felt the description of small town life in the 1950's with its prejudices and problems was very realistic. The last chapter where loose ends were tied up was appreciated as it didn't leave you asking what next. We were also able to share the books we had enjoyed as children - remarkably similar and mainly the classics.

We are hoping that next month we will be able to meet in Margaret's garden and to be able to properly share in the meantime we keep reading!

Scammers are already exploiting Test and Trace for 'phishing' campaigns targeted at vulnerable people.

Remember, real contact tracers will never do any of the following:

- Ask you for details of card or bank account numbers
- Ask you to provide or fill in social media login details
- Ask you to set up a pin
- Ask you to download anything

If you are asked for these types of information, you can report the incident to <u>Action Fraud</u>. (Click here for the site)

If you have been in contact with someone who has tested positive, you should only be asked for the information found <u>on the contact tracing website</u> and <u>on the gov.uk site</u>. This <u>will</u> include your full name, date of birth, and details of any symptoms you may have.

If you have tested positive you will receive a call, text or email from NHS Test & Trace with instructions on how to share details of people you have been in close contact with.

You will be called only from 0300 013 5000 or texted from NHS but unfortunately either of these can be faked. If you do not feel comfortable talking or suspect it is a scam, ask for an email or a text that will invite you to use the Test & Trace website instead. Check the email link carefully – you should only be directed to the web address shown here. Any discrepancies will definitely be a scam!
