They have plastic models if you want them only 00 gauge. They send a price list. Have some Metcalfe kits. OO gauge. Postage included in prices.

It is possible to make several models before deciding on the layout, spare table, shelf round the children's beds, wherever you have space.

Best to get professional help with electric lights, signals, level crossings if you want them.
